The Adjunct Professor Program will begin in January, with Dianna Cichocki, Clinical Assistant Professor in Management Science and Systems at the University at Buffalo

School of Management and St. Mary's parent, joining the SMH Mathematics and Finance Departments. Cichocki teaches Statistical Decisions in Management and Statistical Foundations in Analytics with a focus on incorporating technology into her curriculum.

Professor Cichocki really wants to add a new dynamic to the typical high school classroom: "Most of my lectures at UB are set up online, so I would love to set up something similar to an online lab for St. Mary's students to get them exposed to a different kind of classroom setting," Cichocki said. "...and to really introduce them to [Microsoft] Excel because there is rarely any time to learn these skills in a regular high school stats or precalculus

curriculum. Just having a basic working knowledge of the program can really give St. Mary's students a leg up in college."

Mr. Junik says that the ultimate goal of St. Mary's as an academic institution is to leave students as well prepared as possible for life after high school, and this Adjunct Faculty Program will only bolster this goal: "Academically, we want to expose our students to as many things as we can, so that the things they try in the future won't seem so abstract and they have confidence to not only succeed in college but also in life beyond the classroom," Junik concluded.

Faculty Q & A with Mr. Schu

Last month's "Guess the Teacher" featured a few facts about Mr. Schu, so here's a deeper interview with one of SMH's favorite teachers...

Q: When did you start teaching at St. Mary's and what has been your fondest memory?

A: In the mid-1980's. I started teaching in 1973.

One year while teaching PIG, I had my students actually participate in government, which resulted in them doing a variety of really cool things. The assignment was a group effort of 3-4 students, in which they had to physically get involved by interviewing someone, contacting/volunteering for someone/a group, and then visiting and working for a group... My kids did everything from interviewing politicians and police officers, visiting the Buffalo Quarry, participating in voting registration of the class (Kelleher), and talking to drug counselors. Their work was amazing.

Q: Who is your personal hero and why?

A: That's a tough one. Since so much of my life centers on my church with committee work and Praise Band, I'd have to say Jesus.

Even if you question the veracity of some of the details of His story, they are

truly amazing and the lessons are inspiring. Just think of the countless writings, sermons, prayers, and personal insights that have touched people over the ages.

Q: Knowing all that you do now, if you could give your high school students any words of wisdom, what would you say?

A: Think ahead. Look at consequences. Try to imagine what will happen in the future by the actions you take today. What happens if you study (not just looking over your notes), go to practice and really work, take that chance to volunteer...? Now think about if you do the opposite. If you can't see different outcomes, you're in trouble. Don't live a life of regrets and void of fulfillment.

Q: Any piece of advice for students struggling to decide on a college Uni-

A: Do lots of things in high school so you have an idea as to what you would like to do. Keep in mind that flexibility and ability to adapt will be key to your success and happiness. You will undoubtedly have numerous jobs/careers in your life, ideally sustained by outside interests that help others. Also, work for the environment so all of you have a world to live in.

Q: Anything else you'd like to share with the Marian Gazette readers?

A: "It's time everyone."

The Monsignor Martin team is made up of girls from all of the schools in the Monsignor Martin, including St. Mary's, which has three girls on the team this year. Malicki has noticed the growth in the women's game: "When I coached the first time around, there was only one girl from St. Mary's on the team, and now there are three, so you can definitely see growth there." "Inside the Director's Studio" with Musical Director Miss Ruhland

We sat down with Miss Ruhland as she prepares for St. Mary's next musical adventure to get her thoughts on all things performing arts...

Q: Why did you choose *Once on this Island* for this year's musical?

A: This musical is something different from shows St. Mary's has done in the past. It has a Caribbean flare.

This show includes elements of Romeo and Juliet and elements of the Hans Christian Andersen fairy tale The Little Mermaid. It revolves around a peasant girl on a tropical island, who uses the power of love to bring together people of different social classes.

Q: With auditions coming up, what are some specific things you look for from students trying out to know they'll be successful on stage?

7 Reasons You Should Watch... Elf

'Tis the season for some Christmas movies! Junior Nicole Gorny is back with her take on why Elf is already a classic.

1. Will Ferrell's Performance

Will Ferrell first came into the spotlight during the 1990s — he starred in multiple films such as Zoolander and Austin Powers — and was already well known for his comedic personality (especially on screen). Elf, in which he plays a 30 year-old man who spent the majority of his life in the North Pole believing he's an elf (and a tall one at that), was his first Christmas film. When Ferrell's character, Buddy, finds out that he's actually a human, he travels to New York City in order to find his family that doesn't even know he exists. The true reason this film is so beloved by audiences of all different ages, in my opinion, boils down to the portrayal of Buddy. Stuck in the middle of one of the biggest cities known for harboring people with impatient tendencies, Buddy's innocent curiosity and good heart helps keep the spirits of others alive during the Christmas season. While most characters in the movie find Buddy insane, it's easy for the audience, especially younger viewers, to understand and root for Buddy's mindset, which really displays the brilliance of Ferrell's performance.

2. The Design of the North Pole

Now there are technically two North Poles in this film. The first one is where Santa Claus and his workshop are located, and the second one is a toy shop in New York City (Gimbels) where Buddy was temporarily employed—both are incredibly and intricately designed. The "actual" North Pole pays homage to the classic *Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer* film. From the costume designs to the snowman that talks to Buddy, *Elf* drew heavy inspiration from the Christmas classic.

On the other hand, Gimbels provides the audience with an equally stunning (and possibly more creative) Christmas visual. When Buddy finds out that "Santa" is coming to the store the next day, he wants to make the place as presentable as possible for his arrival, which results in Buddy staying up all night to decorate the store. In case you haven't watched the movie yet, I won't spoil the result by including any pictures, but I can ensure you that the design is unique and jaw-dropping.

3. The Jokes

A recurring joke used throughout the film involves the creation of kid-friendly swear words with a holiday twist. For example, when Buddy says, "I'm a cotton headed ninny muggin," it's easy to assume that it's a foul phrase based on the reaction from the other characters. Later on, Buddy exclaims, "Son of a Nutcracker!" Since the movie is as popular as it is, you're bound to find at least one person familiar with these "swears words." The humor doesn't end in holiday swears though, since it's also strongly presented in practically every scene, like Buddy's mistaking of a man with dwarfism for an elf. This scene is definitely bound to receive laughs from the younger audience, but one can't help but cringe (as well as laugh) at the situation as an adult. Throughout the film, a ton of misread situations also contribute to the plot's advancement.

4. The Family Dynamic

Although it's been touched upon in other films, Elf provides a different spin on a neglecting parent and their eventual redemption. In the film, Buddy's biological father, Walter Hobbs, is completely dedicated to his work as a children's book publisher, and neglects his wife and younger son (Michael) in the process. Though this tends to make Walter appear to be the stereotypical "bad guy," he eventually makes amends for his past mistakes. One scene early on provides the audience with a glimpse into the true goodness of Walter's heart, in which he reflects upon a picture of Buddy's biological mom (Susan) and himself in their vounger years before she died, which adds a nice touch to the film as a more serious and sentimental moment. Elf offers a plethora of comedy, but also incorporates romance and the perfect amount of tender family moments. Despite the ending arguably being considered "forced," it's also looked upon as a suitable finale since all loose ends are tied and a happy conclusion ensues, which fits the film's overall atmosphere.

5. Santa Claus

Elf's Santa Claus provides the audience with a different approach to the iconic Christmas symbol and folktale, which definitely adds to the movie's originality. While not featured heavily, the portrayal of Santa Claus in this film is not the jolly old Saint Nick everyone is most likely used to — he comes off as a rather gruff and straight-forward person. Though his scenes are limited, it quickly becomes obvious that he's probably not the kind of person whose lap you'd want to sit on. After all, he's the one who delivered the bad news to Buddy regarding his dad's "Naughty List" presence. Now, I'm not sure if any other viewers were bothered by this, but during the ending after enough "Christmas spirit" was able to lift the sleigh off the ground, Santa basically left Buddy off the sleigh before

6. The Message

A film's message is always up for interpretation, but one of the messages that almost everyone agrees on for Elf revolves around the importance of family: hold your family close to your heart and make sure they're at the top of your priorities, especially during the holidays. A hidden message can also be found, which regards the importance of maintaining one's childhood innocence. Many people have memories of joyfully running into their living rooms on Christmas morning to see the presents left by Santa under the tree.
