Currents available electronically

The August issue of *Currents* is the only issue which is always printed and mailed home to all families of St. Mary's High School. Issues the rest of the year will be emailed directly to families using the SchoolReach information. They will also be available electronically at the St. Mary's website (smhlancers.org). Printed copies may also be picked up in the Main Office.

St. Mary's to continue use of SchoolReach for phone, email messages

Again this year, St. Mary's will be utilizing the telephone and e-mail broadcast system called SchoolReach. This system enables the school to notify all households and parents by phone of an emergency or unplanned event that causes early dismissal, school cancellation, or late start. The service is also used to communicate via phone and/or e-mail general announcements, reminders, and other information important to the members of the St. Mary's community.

In an important effort to make the best and most accurate use of the SchoolReach Instant Parent Contact System, we are asking that you fill out the following Information Update Form with the requested necessary information if you need to update your contact information or wish to add additional phone numbers. Because many students have their own phones and e-mail addresses, they may also be included in the Contact System. Please note – we will use the contact information system you provided previously unless you wish to update your information.

St. Mary's will continue to report school closings as we have in the past: on radio and TV and the St. Mary's web page, answering machine, and Facebook page. SchoolReach will be utilized as an overlay to the public announcements.

When used, the service will call all phone numbers in our selected parent contact lists and will deliver a recorded message from a school administrator. The service will deliver the message to both live answer and answering machines. No answers (phones ringing over 40 sec.) and busies will be

automatically retried twice in fifteen minute intervals after the initial call.

For those who have been a part of the SchoolReach system before, did you know?

- SchoolReach has a Parent App for your iPhone or iPad. This app offers families quick control over contact information and messages right in the palm of their hands. With the app, families can manage multiple schools and students at once; review, edit and save all contact information; control voice and Email preferences; make instant "Opt In/Opt Out" elections; have easy & convenient access at all times; and listen to all previous voice messages. Go to the App Store or www.schoolreach.com to get the app. for your device.
- If you want to re-listen to a message sent by St. Mary's High School, use the phone that the message was originally received on and call 855-955-8500. This will have all messages from the last 30 days.

Please consider these numbers carefully and make an effort to keep us informed as soon as possible if any number changes for any reason.

- 2) All information and contact numbers are strictly secure and confidential and are only used for St. Mary's messaging.

Policy - Medication in School

Forms are available in the Main Office, the Health Office and on the school website.

All medication, including non-prescription drugs such as Tylenol, Motrin, etc. given in school must be prescribed by a licensed medical doctor. A written request from the physician must be on file. This request must indicate the dosage and frequency of the prescribed drug.

A written request from the parent to administer medication must be on file.

The parent must assume responsibility to have the medication delivered to the Health Office in a *properly labeled original container*.

This is not a mandatory purchase by any means, and there is no minimum number that needs to be ordered to obtain the prices offered. This is simply something we wanted to make available to interested families. The jackets ordered will be navy in color, will have a color Lancer mascot embroidered and will have the school name embroidered in white.

Orders can be turned in to the Main Office (in an envelope) any time on or before September 27.

As stated in the enclosed letter, all orders must be accompanied by a \$20 deposit.

Student to invite NHS candidates

Once the school year begins, Mr. Keith Kidder, the NHS Induction Coordinator, will be inviting students who academically qualify to become a candidate for the St. Mary's National Honor Society. To be eligible for consideration, a student must be a junior or a senior who has a cumulative average of 90 percent or higher.

Soon after the distribution of Candidate Materials, the Induction Coordinator will hold an evening Candidate/Parent Informational Session to explain the selection process in more detail and review all forms in the Candidate Packet.

As part of the Candidate Process, students will be asked to complete the following:

- Activity Form students will list their school, service, and/or leadership activities in and out of school.
- Leadership Referral Forms to be completed by supervisors of student's leadership activities.

- Service Referral Forms to be completed by supervisors of student's service activities.
- Personal Essay written by the student to summarize their achievements, interests, and other information they believe should be considered.

As announced last year, St. Mary's has detailed the number of required service hours. Students are required to have completed 25 hours of service beyond what is required for Religion classes (that is, Junior Candidates must have completed at least 55 hours of service; Senior Candidates need to have completed at least 85 hours)

Once turned in, the candidate materials will be submitted to the Faculty Council for their review and consideration. Candidates will be notified either way by Mr. Kidder. Students selected for the National Honor Society will be inducted at a ceremony on November 21.

More complete information regarding the Selection process will be found in the Student-Parent Handbook, available on the St. Mary's High School website.

New student information system

This coming school year will see major changes in how St. Mary's High School records and reports student information. After six years, the school is changing to a new, more modern student information system.

Highlights of the new system include:

- Teachers will be able to more easily update grades from any location that has an Internet connection.
- Edline will no longer be used. Grades
 will be viewed with a new system —
 basically, parents and students will be
 viewing the grade books as grades
 are entered.
- Grades from any time during the school year will be available, not just the most recent quarter.
- The system should be faster and easier to use.

More information will be provided in the September issue of Currents and during Parent-Go-to-School Night on September 23.

Transportation information

Information regarding transportation is sent to parents from the public school district at the end of August. This information is not sent to St. Mary's High School. If you do not receive your bus information, or if you have questions or problems with the arrangements, please call the Transportation Department of your school district.

Incoming freshmen from Buffalo may receive their bus passes when they come for orientation on August 28. Upperclassmen will get theirs on the first day of school.

Remember: Students are never allowed to ride a bus from a school district other than their own. Public school districts are only insured for their own residents.

 Students will not receive Free and Reduced Lunch until their application has been received and approved. Remember: Applications are due by August 26.

Reduced Lunch Application Information

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. St. Mary's High School offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.00; lunch costs \$3.00. Your children may gualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is 25¢ for breakfast and 25¢ for lunch.

- **1. Do I need to fill out an application for each child?** No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced price meals. *Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household.* We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to St. Mary's High School.
- 2. Who can get free meals? All children in households receiving benefits from SNAP, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, or TANF can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- 3. Can foster children get free meals? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.
- **4. Can homeless, runaway, and migrant children get free meals?** Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail St. Mary's High School to see if they qualify.
- 5. Who can get reduced price meals? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- 6. Should I fill out an application if I received a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free meals? Please read the letter you received carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at 683-4824 and ask for Evelyn Skalski if you have questions.
- 7. My child's application was approved last year. Do I need to fill out another one? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you your child is eligible for the new year.
- **8. I get WIC; can my child(ren) get free meals?** Children in households participating in WIC *may* be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out a Free/Reduced Price Meal application.
 - 9. Will the information I give be checked? Yes, and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- **10.** If I don't qualify now, may I apply later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
- 11. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to Mrs. Rebecca Kranz, principal, St. Mary's High School.
- 12. May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen? Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.
- 13. Who should I include as members of my household? You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.
- 14. What if my income is not always the same? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally get \$1,000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only got \$900, put down that you made \$1,000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
- 15. We are in the military. Do we include our housing allowance as income? If you get an off-base allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.
- 16. My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. Is her combat pay counted as income? No. If the combat pay is received in addition to her basic pay because of her deployment and it wasn't received before she was deployed, combat pay is not counted as income. Contact your school for more information.
- 17. My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for? To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call 1-800-342-3009.

How to Apply: To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you may submit an Eligibility Letter for Free Meals/Milk (formerly Direct Certification Letter) received from the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, OR carefully complete one application for your household and return it to the designated office. If you now receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) for any children, or participate in the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), the application must include the children's names, the household SNAP, TANF, or FDPIR case number, and the signature of an adult household member. All children should be listed on the same application. If you do not list a SNAP, TANF, or FDPIR case number for all the children for whom you are applying, the application must include the names of everyone in the household, the amount of income each household member receives, and how often it is received and where it comes from. It must include the signature of an adult household member and the last four digits of that adult's social security number, or check the box if the adult does not have a social security number. An application that is not complete cannot be approved. Contact your local Department of Social Services for your SNAP or TANF case number or complete the income portion of the application.

Reporting Changes: The benefits that you are approved for at the time of application are effective for the entire school year. You no longer need to report changes for an increase in income or decrease in household size, or if you no longer receive food stamps.

Income Exclusions: The value of any child care provided or arranged, or any amount received as payment for such child care or reimbursement for costs incurred for such care under the Child Care Development (Block Grant) Fund should not be considered as income for this program.

Nondiscrimination Statement: The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibits discrimination against its customers, employees, and applicants for employment on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, sex, gender identity, religion, reprisal, and where applicable, political beliefs, marital status, familial or parental status, sexual orientation, or all or part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance program, or protected genetic information in employment or in any program or activity conducted or funded by the Department. (Not all prohibited basis will apply to all programs and/or employment activities.

Meal Service to Children With Disabilities: Federal regulations require schools and institutions to serve meals at no extra charge to children with a disability which may restrict their diet. A student with a disability is defined in 7CFR Part 15b.3 of Federal regulations, as one who has a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities. Major life activities are defined to include functions such as caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning, and working. You must request the special meals from the school and provide the school with medical certification from a medical doctor. If you believe your child needs substitutions because of a disability, please get in touch with us for further information, as there is specific information that the medical certification must contain.

Confidentiality: The United States Department of Agriculture has approved the release of students' names and eligibility status, without parent/guardian consent, to persons directly connected with the administration or enforcement of federal education programs such as Title I and the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), which are United States Department of Education programs used to determine areas such as the allocation of funds to schools, to evaluate socioeconomic status of the school's attendance area, and to assess educational progress. Information may also be released to State health or State education programs administered by the State agency or local education agency, provided the State or local education agency administers the program, and federal, State, or local nutrition programs similar to the National School Lunch Program. Additionally, all information contained in the free and reduced price application may be released to persons directly connected with the administration or enforcement of programs authorized under the National School Lunch Act (NSLA) or Child Nutrition Act (CNA), including the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, the Special Milk Program, the Child and Adult Care Food Program, Summer Food Service Program and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women Infants and Children (WIC), the Comptroller General of the United States for audit purposes, and federal, State, or local law enforcement officials investigating alleged violation of the programs under the NSLA or CNA.

The disclosure of eligibility information not specifically authorized by the NSLA requires a written consent statement from the parent/guardian.

- (1) Write the names of everyone in your household, whether or not they get income. Include yourself, the children you are applying for, all other children, your spouse, grandparents, and other related and unrelated people in your household. Use another piece of paper if you need more space.

OTHER BENEFITS: Your child may be eligible for benefits such as Medicaid or Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). In order to determine if your child is eligible, program officials need information from your free and reduced price meal application. Your written consent is required before any information may be released. Please refer to the attached parent Disclosure Letter and Consent Statement for information about other benefits.

PRIVACY ACT STATEMENT: This explains how we will use the information you give us.

The Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act requires the information on this application. You do not have to give the information, but if you do not, we cannot approve your child for free or reduced price meals. You must include the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. The last four digits of the social security number are not required when you apply on behalf of a foster child or you list a Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Program or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) case number or other FDPIR identifier for your child or when you indicate that the adult household member signing the application does not have a social security number. We will use your information to determine if your child is eligible for free or reduced price meals, and for administration and enforcement of the lunch and breakfast programs. We MAY share your eligibility information with education, health, and nutrition programs to help them evaluate, fund, or determine benefits for their programs, auditors for program reviews, and law enforcement officials to help them lock into violations of program rules.

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Dress Code for 2013-14

The following are the changes to the St. Mary's High School Dress Code for the 2013-14 School Year:

- Students may wear gray dress pants, in addition to the navy and khaki. Ladies still need to purchase their pants through Flynn & O'Hara.
- Gentlemen may wear a solid white, solid black, or solid brown colored belt.
- The Pride Day Dress now includes solid gray sweatpants or gray sweatpants with a white strip. Not black!
 Below is the complete Dress Code for 2013-14:

Ladies

- Properly sized navy, khaki, or gray dress pants (with the "SMH" logo) purchased from Flynn & O'Hara are the only pants allowed for ladies. The pants may not be ripped or torn. Pants from American Eagle or Aeropostale are not allowed.
- A properly-sized <u>solid-colored</u> Oxford buttoned blouse with a buttoned collar, long or short sleeve, tucked in, may be worn all year except on Liturgy days (On Liturgy days, blouse must be blue or white). The school recommends purchasing these from Flynn & O'Hara to ensure that you have the correct style.
- Dress shirts may not have extra darts or seams causing the shirt to be a tight fit.
- The official St. Mary's High School Polo shirts may be worn all year except on Liturgy days. Club and athletic polo shirts are not allowed as part of the regular dress code. Regular polo shirts must be tucked in at all times; banded polo shirts do not have to be tucked in.
- Embroidered St. Mary's sweatshirts, St. Mary's sweaters, St. Mary's fleeces, or solid navy blue, solid white, or solid gray sweaters may be worn over the dress shirt, a white, navy, or gray turtleneck, or the St. Mary's polo shirt. Thermal or long-sleeve t-shirts are not allowed. Club and athletic sweatshirts and fleeces are not allowed as part of the regular dress code.
- "Sweater" is defined as a long-sleeved, heavy-gauge, knitted, wool or cotton garment that fits the body loosely. Sweaters may have zip-up fronts.
- Turtleneck sweaters (solid navy, solid white, or solid gray) may be worn without a dress shirt / polo shirt underneath.
- Navy blue blazers or navy blue vests may be worn over the dress shirt, white St. Mary's polo shirt, or a white, navy, or gray turtleneck.
- T-shirts worn under a dress shirt must be white with no lettering or design.
- Black, navy, white, or beige stockings or black, navy, gray, or white knee socks and shoes must be worn. No patterns, bows, buttons, or other designs are allowed on the socks/stockings.
- All girls are required to purchase the uniform skort that is available from Flynn & O'Hara. The skort must be no more than two inches above the knee. They are only required to wear the uniform skort on Liturgy days or other special occasions requiring formal dress.
- Dress shoes must be worn and cannot be backless, canvas, slippers, or boots.
- · Shoes must be properly worn.

Gentlemen

- Properly sized navy, khaki or gray dress pants worn with a solid brown, solid black, or solid white colored belt. The school recommends purchasing these from Flynn & O'Hara to ensure that you have the correct style. Pants with rivets, sewn-on pockets, stripes, or ripped/torn cuffs are not to be worn. Pants may not be worn below the waistline. Pants from American Eagle or Aeropostale are not allowed.
- A properly-sized <u>solid-colored</u> Oxford buttoned dress shirt with buttoned collar, fully buttoned and tucked in may be worn all

- year except on Liturgy days (On Liturgy days, shirt must be blue or white). Shirt must be worn with a tie. Bow ties may be worn.
- The official St. Mary's High School Polo shirts may be worn all year except on Liturgy days. Club and athletic polo shirts are not allowed as part of the regular dress code. Polo shirts must be tucked in at all times. T-shirts worn under polo shirts may be solid navy, white, or gray. No lettering or design from the t-shirt may be visible.
- Embroidered St. Mary's sweatshirts, St. Mary's sweaters, St. Mary's fleeces, or solid navy blue, solid gray, or solid white sweaters may be worn over the dress shirt with tie, a white, blue, or gray turtleneck, or the St. Mary's polo shirt. Thermal or long-sleeve t-shirts are not allowed. Club and athletic sweatshirts and fleeces are not allowed as part of the regular dress code.
- "Sweater" is defined as a long-sleeved, heavy-gauge, knitted, wool or cotton garment that fits the body loosely. Sweaters may have zip-up fronts.
- Turtleneck sweaters (solid navy, solid white, or solid gray) may be worn without a dress shirt / polo shirt underneath.
- Navy blue blazers or navy blue vests may be worn over the dress shirt with tie, St. Mary's white polo shirt, or a white, blue, or gray turtleneck.
- T-shirts worn under a dress shirt must be white with no lettering or design.
- Solid brown or solid black dress shoes with socks must be worn.
- No makeup or nail polish may be worn.
- Dress shoes cannot be backless, canvas, slippers, or boots. No athletic shoes may be worn.
- Shoes must be properly worn.

The following rules apply to all students:

- No sandals or open-toed shoes may be worn. No slippers or moccasins may be worn.
- No outerwear may be worn.
- The only acceptable sweatshirts and fleeces are embroidered SMH or approved class sweatshirts (without hoods).
- Body piercing is limited to two earrings per ear for girls, no earrings for boys, including dress down days. Spacers used to increase the size of holes in ears are prohibited. Wearing a bandage over "illegal" piercings is not permitted.
- Visible tattoos and heavy metal chains are not allowed including dress down days.
- Long-sleeve shirts worn under short sleeve shirts are not allowed.
- No Capri pants or shorts may be worn.
- No gloves of any kind may be worn.
- No wristbands or sweatbands may be worn.
- Nothing sheer or see-through may ever be worn, including dress down days.
- Nothing sleeveless may ever be worn, including dress down days.
- Students are not allowed to have writing or drawings on their skin at any time.

- Sleeves on polo shirts may not be rolled and collars may not be flipped up.
- During June Exams, footwear regulation is relaxed flip-flops, sneakers, etc. are allowed.

Hair

- Hair should be kept neat, clean, and combed at all times. No bizarre haircuts or hair colors are permitted. There should be no spikes, puffs, Mohawks, etc. Boys' hair must be no longer than collar length, and the front must be at least one-finger'swidth off of the eyebrows. No portion of the head will be shaved. Any bizarre hairstyle will result in daily detention until the problem is corrected.
- Students are expected to be clean-shaven on a daily basis. No facial hair is permitted. Sideburns must be trimmed, neat, and not extend below the earlobe.

Pride Day Dress

- Students may wear any official St. Mary's attire including class shirts, school sports t-shirts/sweatshirts, school sweatpants, school shorts, school hats.
- Solid navy/gray pants or navy/gray pants with white stripes down the leg may be worn.
- No jeans are allowed.
- Earring and facial hair regulations remain in effect.
- Sneakers or sandals may be worn if the student is wearing Pride Day Dress.

Liturgy Day Dress

- To achieve a sense of unity in the celebration of important moments in the life of the St. Mary's community and to deepen our awareness of our Catholic faith, all students will attend all school liturgies and prayer services. On days when a liturgy is scheduled, students must follow the rules for "liturgy day dress:"
- No polo shirts will be allowed.
- Gentlemen are required to wear a blue or white dress shirt and tie as defined previously.
- Ladies are required to wear a blue or white dress shirt as defined previously and are required to wear a uniform skort.
- Dress code sweaters, approved St. Mary's sweatshirts, vests, blazers are permitted over the dress shirts.

This dress code may also be in effect for other special occasions

and field trips. Announcements will be made in advance.

Jeans Day Dress

Throughout the school year, organizations may run a jeans day as a fundraiser for outside charities. These need to be proposed and approved through the Principal's Advisory Board.

On a jeans day, students may wear:

- Jeans they may not be ripped/torn or excessively oversized.
- Sweatpants, windpants, cargo pants, corduroy pants, Capri pants
- Sneakers or sandals

They may NOT wear:

- · Jean shorts or shorts of any kind
- Jean skirts or skirts of any kind
- Hats

Modesty will always be stressed. Earring and facial hair regulations remain in effect.

If a student chooses not to participate, they must be in regular dress code.

Baccalaureate Mass / Graduation

The following policy must be adhered to during these events: the Baccalaureate Mass, Senior Family Brunch, and Graduation Ceremony. Failure to follow these rules will result in the student not being allowed to participate in that event. The graduation fee will not be refunded.

Because these are formal events hosted by the school, there will be strict adherence to the school dress code policy regarding hair, earrings, body-piercing, and facial hair. Messages on caps/gowns are not permitted.

- Ladies must be modestly dressed in a dress, skirt/blouse, or a pants suit. Dress shoes or dress sandals must be worn. No flip-flops. No bizarre socks, stockings, or shoes may be worn.
- Gentlemen must wear dress pants, a dress shirt (preferably white) and tie, as well as dress shoes.

In all cases regarding these events, the final decision regarding participation will be decided by the Administration of the school.

The Dean of Student Affairs will make the final determination as to whether or not a student's attire violates the dress code.

Modesty will be stressed. Any bizarre appearance, in clothing or hair, is unacceptable.

- Part II An in-class writing assignment will be done on Tuesday, September 10th, for the novel Jane Eyre. A second in-class writing assignment will be done on Wednesday, September 11th, for the second book you chose to read. It would be beneficial for you to take notes on the following literary elements found in each book: setting, characterization, conflict and theme.

Assignment for AP Language:

This book of choice will be used as our second in-class rhetorical analysis essay, to be written on Thursday, September 12.

It would be beneficial for you to take notes on rhetorical elements used by King and the author of your third book; rhetorical elements include: tone, diction, syntax, irony, symbolism, ambiguity, allusion, arrangement, structure, connotation, figures of speech, style, repetition, etc. FYI – you must discuss 3 rhetorical elements in a rhetorical analysis essay.
