



Now Presenting… The Academies at St. Mary's High School

In an ongoing effort to innovate and advance the school's college-preparatory curriculum, St. Mary's High School is proud to announce the development of **The Academies at St. Mary's High School**, which will launch at the start of the 2022-23 school year.

This pioneering initiative will allow students to participate in focused areas of study during their Sophomore, Junior, and Senior years with the end goal for them to achieve a deeper understanding of the potential career paths and majors that colleges and universities offer. Freshmen will automatically be enrolled in The Academy of The First Year, giving them the tools to succeed over the next four years of high school.

The Academies will be managed by St. Mary's dedicated faculty, under the guidance of the Dean of Academic Affairs, Mr. Keith Junik, and enhanced by adjunct professors and guest lecturers, including professionals from the school's passionate alumni base, parents, and local and national experts in their fields. The Academies will meet twice weekly for 80 minutes and co-exist with the gold-standard New York State Regents Curriculum and Lancer Life Curriculum currently offered at St. Mary's. St. Mary's High School currently ranks seventh in *Buffalo Business First's* rankings of 131 high schools in Western New York.

"We are always trying to be innovative and creative when it comes to our curriculum," said Dean of Academic Affairs, Keith Junik. "A few years ago, we instituted the Lancer Life Curriculum, which mandates students take courses that teach important life skills, like public speaking, leadership, personal finance, and our award-winning senior portfolio capstone project. The Academies at St. Mary's High School takes that initiative even further, giving our students a real advantage as they head off to college, already having a background in majors they may want to pursue or crossing things off the list they're no longer interested in," Junik concluded.

"It is the overall student experience and the desire to make it a rewarding, positive, and practical one that motivates the Administration at St. Mary's High School," said Head of School, Kevin Kelleher. "We want to make that student experience second to none, and programs like this – that are a forward-thinking way to educate – allow us to do just that. A new initiative like this gets our students, faculty, and staff even more excited about our future. Our families are thrilled with the concept. We're looking forward to developing The Academies at St. Mary's High School into an academic tradition of unparalleled excellence," Kelleher said.

> Academies 101

• The Academy of The First Year is designed as an introduction to St. Mary's High School and our expectations and values. The goal is to identify ways in which students will feel confident and driven within the academic setting and beyond, engaging them with a variety of resources and activities. All Freshmen will be automatically enrolled in this Academy.

The Business, Finance, & Entrepreneurship Academy

prepares students to pursue a business or financial-related major in college by providing an overview of the principles associated with each topic. These principles will then be put into practice through the development and management of several on-campus initiatives, including The Lancer Fund Stock Market Challenge, concession stand management, and more, bringing the concepts of small business management and accounting to life.

The Engineering and Experimental Design Academy

teaches students the fundamentals of chemical, civil, electrical, and mechanical engineering. Through a combination of theory and handson projects, students will be introduced to different fields in engineering. Students will also engage in the process of experimental design, used by science professionals, to collect, analyze, and present their own scientific data.

The Journalism & Marketing Academy

will further develop the skills needed to pursue careers in the fast-paced world of media. This writing-intensive academy will create the foundation for students to be successful in any avenue of these fields, including print, social media, newscasting, podcasts, web, and video production and editing. In this hands-on environment, students will also dive into the current journalism and marketing efforts of the school.

In **The Law & Criminal Justice Academy,** students interested in law, governance, justice, and public service will build a strong foundation of the skills, knowledge, and experience needed to pursue careers in these fields. Few fields combine theory and practice so effectively, opening diverse avenues for applying the tools of intellect to the problems of society and combine the liberal arts advantage with the lens of Catholic understanding.

The Hospitality & Event Planning Academy will be extremely hands-on, as students will work to plan, ex-

ecute, and manage various events and functions. Rooted in tourism and travel, hospitality and event planning give students a taste of what the industry can be like on a global scale, taking them all over the country, and even the world, if they choose to pursue careers in these fields.

The goal of this academy is to provide students with a base level of experience so they can go on to pursue careers as doctors, nurses, therapists, pharmacists, social workers, lab technicians, psychologists, and more.

Enrollment Sees Strategic Growth

Over the past five years, St. Mary's is one of only two private schools in Western New York to see a growth in enrollment and is now the third-largest private school in the area. As a whole, enrollment is up over 35% over those five years (324 students vs 450 students). With over 450 students currently in the building and that number expected to grow with a large incoming Freshmen class, many factors have contributed to this growth: the implementation and marketing of an innovative curriculum (The Academies at St. Mary's High School), academic success in being ranked 7th of 131 high schools in WNY (Business First), success on the athletic fields and stage, the enthusiasm and involvement of talented, connected, and successful alumni, the diligence of Dean of Student Life & Admissions, Andrea Drabik and her team, and keeping in-person learning going amid the pandemic.



"We're filling the building with the best students and families, and that creates a kind of cycle. Our students do great things, people see that, and then more people want to become a part of what we're doing here," said Head of School Kevin Kelleher.

St. Mary's is widely recognized as the best-value private school in the area, committed to working with families to ensure a St. Mary's education is affordable, while offering the highest quality, most innovative education possible.

Buffalo Jr. Sabres student athletes attend school at St. Mary's from 7:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., taking all of the core classes required to graduate from St. Mary's, following a NYS Regents curriculum and taking part in St. Mary's Lancer Life Curriculum. Then, in a true Academy-like setting, the student athletes head to LECOM Harborcenter at 1:00 p.m. for on and off-ice training with Academy of Hockey coaches, Tim Kennedy and Nick Tuzzolino, and Impact Sports Performance coach es, Kevin Phengthavone, MS, CSCS, CSAC and Brian DeLuca, PT, MBA, CSCS, CAFS. The players have a mandatory, supervised study hall period woven into their schedule at the LECOM Harborcenter.

St. Mary's is thrilled to have around over 30 Buffalo Jr. Sabres enrolled for the 2021-22 school year and expects that number to grow heading into 2023 as well.

For the second year in a row, St. Mary's defeated Bishop Timon to capture the Monsignor Martin B League Championship. The Lancers rolled over their opponents all season, finishing the season with an 8-1 record and a 39-point average margin of victory.

St. Mary's defeated the likes of Cardinal O'Hara, Cleveland Hill, and St. Joe's on their road to eight wins. Head Coach Matt Ard and his staff have

Christian Lewis Breaks League Rushing Record

Senior Christian Lewis broke the Monsignor Martin single-season rushing record after piling up 2,141 yards in St. Mary's nine games this year.

Lewis broke the record in the championship game against Bishop Timon, running for an astonishing 245 yards in that game alone.

"My line played phenomenal this season, and I wouldn't have done this without them," said Lewis. "I have a great quarterback throwing the ball and getting me open for runs, and I love everyone on this team. We all did the record. I didn't just do it. We all did it."



The Nicholas Pilipauskis Scholarship

Pilipauskis was a graduate of Lancaster High School's Class of 1999 and an integral part of the Lancaster Football Team. He then went onto Purdue, studying Business and Finance and was also a walk-on on the Purdue football team.

The Women's Soccer Team defeated rival Nichols 4-2 in the Monsignor Martin Division A Championship this Fall for the second time in three years. The St. Mary's win avenged an earlier season loss to the Vikings. The Lancers got shots on goal early and often, and senior Shae O'Rourke scored twice in the first 21 minutes, finishing the game with a hat trick. The Lancers then moved onto the State Championships, where they won a thrilling six-round penalty-shot game in the semifinals before falling to a tough St. Anthony's team in the final.

Volleyball Takes Home League and State Titles

St. Mary's Volleyball is no stranger to State Championships, but as Head Coach Don Pieczynski always points out, each year's team is different and each season brings along its own set of challenges. This year, the team battled through injuries and pandemic protocols, but the result was still the same - for the 18th time.

St. Mary's defeated Sacred Heart in a raucous Nardin gym in straight sets to bring home the Monsignor Martin Title and earn a spot in the NYS Championships on Long Island. The Lancers never dropped a set in the state championship, defeating Fontbonne Hall 25-18, 25-12, and 25-19 in the final to capture their 18th NYS Championship.

Men's Basketball Wins Class B State Championship

In Head Coach Ryan Gallo's first season at the helm, St. Mary's won the Manhattan Cup Class B Title Game against Nichols 71-68, affording them the chance to represent the Monsignor Martin in the Class B State Catholic Tournament.

In the game against Nichols, senior standout Massimo Moretti *(right)* led the way with 27 points and 15 rebounds. Moretti is a senior international student from Italy and averaged a double-double over the course of the season at over 20 points and 15 rebounds a game. The team staged a fourth-quarter comeback to put Nichols away and advance to the State Tournament. Moretti was



named First Team All-Catholic and First Team All-WNY Small School.

This year's Class B State Title Game was held in Western New York at ECC, giving the Lancers a bit of a home-court advantage over down-state Cathedral Prep. After a tight first half, the Lancers opened the third quarter on a 10-0 run and never looked back, defeating Cathedral Prep 60-53 to win the Class B State Championship *(below)*.

Men's Hockey Team Takes Home Monsignor Martin League Cup

St. Mary's has three men's hockey teams - that's right, three whole teams!

The Men's Federation Hockey Team competes against the best schools in Western New York, including other private Catholic high schools and public schools. The team finished the season with a 12-3-1 overall record, beating the likes of St. Joe's, Lancaster, Canisius, and Amherst.

The team clinched the Monsignor Martin League Cup for the first time in school history with a thrilling 6-5 overtime victory against Nichols on February 6th.

Unfortunately, their quest for a second Niagara Cup fell just short, as the team lost to a tough St. Francis team 1-0 in the semifinals at HarborCenter.

The Varsity Blue and White Hockey Teams also had great years, finishing with wins and playing time for a lot of young men who love the game of hockey.

Dr. David Hangauer '70

Dr. Hangauer graduated in 1980 from the University at Buffalo (UB) with his PhD in Organic Chemistry. He then began his impressive career at the pharmaceutical giant, Merck, before returning to UB to join the faculty as an Associate Professor of Chemistry in 1989. As a professor at UB, he led research on a new approach to discovering specific protein kinase inhibitors,

which led to the development of Mimeticas – a patented technology that would prove monumental to Hangauer's success in later business pursuits. His UB laboratory subsequently launched a basic research program into unraveling the energetics behind drugs binding to their receptors.

From his work and research at UB, Dr. Hangauer put academic science and drug design into actual practice with the creation of drugs that would benefit cancer patients. Hangauer has been deeply affected by cancer, as his father and father-in-law passed away from the disease, while his youngest son is a cancer survivor. Therefore, his mission to develop novel drugs for oncology and immune-modulatory diseases has been a very personal one throughout his career. Out of his UB Chemistry Lab then sprung Athenex (formerly known as Kinex) – a company which he co-founded and of which he later became the Chief Science Officer.

In a landmark facilities-use agreement with UB, Hangauer was able to bring in early Athenex employees to his lab to work. As Athenex grew, and the discoveries made there continued, Athenex built its headquarters in the Biomedical Corridor in downtown Buffalo. Athenex also established additional facilities around the world and has now grown to over 600 employees.

Since its initial opening out of Hangauer's UB Lab, Athenex has raised hundreds of millions of dollars, including a \$225 million investment from New York State to foster job development in Western New York, and carried out a successful IPO on the Nasdag Stock Exchange in 2017.

Hangauer's contributions to science in developing drugs to help treat cancers and other ailments are his true legacy, which is cemented in the dozens of awards he has received throughout his career and since his retirement in 2016. His abilities as an entrepreneur add to that legacy. He is now a mentor to a series of new biomedical start-up companies in Buffalo to share his expertise.

Dr. Hangauer participated in St. Mary's' Adjunct Professor Program last year, where prominent alumni and community members in various fields teach classes at the school a few times a semester. Dr. Hangauer gave a Zoom presentation to AP Biology and AP Chemistry classes entitled, "How University Research Can Benefit Patients and the U.S. Economy: Athenex Inc., A Buffalo Example."
