



The Academies at SMHS Gear Up for Year Two

At the beginning of last school year, The Academies at St. Mary's High School were launched as a new academic initiative. The Academies give students the opportunity to participate in one of ten focused areas of study, similar to college majors.

Students registered online for one of the Academies, just like college students register for their own classes. Freshmen were automatically enrolled in The Academy of the First Year, which focused on study skills and "the ways of St. Mary's," giving them a great foundation to succeed throughout high school.

The Academies ran twice a week for 60-minute sessions from September to March. This new program coexists with St. Mary's NYS Regents curriculum and the Lancer Life Curriculum, which includes classes like public speaking, leadership skills, and personal finance. Each Academy was taught by a team of St. Mary's faculty and staff members, and all Academies were overseen by Dean of Academics, Keith Junik.

The first year of The Academies at St. Mary's High School was largely a success. As with any new program, some fine-tuning is necessary to continually improve this new initiative for the students. Some of those improvements in year two will include having students choose one Academy per semester (two per year), adding two new Academies and dissolving two, naming only one or two teachers to lead an Academy, moving the time of day the Academies will take place, allowing freshmen to choose one Academy, and requiring seniors to take the College Prep Academy to end their high school careers.

"We believe that The Academies at St. Mary's High School is the way of the future," said Dean of Academics, Keith Junik. "As a private school, we have to offer something unique to our students and families - something that will give them a competitive edge going forward. The Academies allow us to do just that," he concluded.

There were so many highlights from the first year of The Academies at St. Mary's High School. So let's check them out!

The International Relations & Global Citizenship Academy welcomed Dawne Hoeg, the Founder and Executive Director of Stitch Buffalo, to speak to students about the organization and its mission this past November. Stitch Buffalo is a textile art center committed to empowering refugee and immigrant women through the sale of their handcrafted goods, inspiring creativity and inclusion through community education, and stewarding the environment through the re-use of textile supplies.

The students in the Academy had an idea to collaborate with the ladies of Stitch Buffalo, as well as Ms. Hoeg, on a Global Citizenship patch for the Academy. Stitch Buffalo has a workshop and storefront on Niagara Street in Buffalo where they produce many products, including pins, clothing, ornaments, and jewelry. The Academy viewed the handiwork of these amazing women and worked to design the Academy patch with the help of these women.

On the final day of the Academies, students received their patches. Students learned about and participated in the full product development process and created something that spans borders and cultures through multi-lingual collaboration.

The Marketing and Journalism Academy published several pieces, contributed to the school's social media accounts and yearbook, and heard from several guest speakers throughout the year.

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Law & Criminal Justice

The Law & Criminal Justice Academy welcomed CDFR Haji Shareef (*right*), a US Navy veteran, to speak with students about his role in the military, his work with Mercy Flight, and training his canines. CDFR Shareef is the founder of Musketeer Canine LLC and PTSDogs 4 VETs, where he specializes in training service dogs for assistance with PTSD.

The Academy also welcomed a very special guest speaker, Stephen Kasper *(right)*. Kasper is a world renown consultant on fingerprinting and latent evidence and is even a published author on those topics. He retired from the Amherst Police Department, Lee County Sheriffs, and Florida Department of Law Enforcement and taught at Edison College.

Back in November, St. Mary's Women's Soccer Team defeated Nichols 4-3 in OT for the Monsignor Martin High School Championship (*right*). The championship marks the second in a row for the Women's Soccer Program. Junior Kristin Middaugh scored three goals in the match and was named the championship MVP. Senior captain Claire DeAngelis assisted on all three of the goals. Women's Volleyball Captures 19th State Title

#19 seems to be a lucky one for St. Mary's Volleyball. After winning their 19th straight Monsignor Martin Championship (35th overall) in straight sets against Sacred Heart, the team captured its 19th State Title in program history in thrilling fashion on their home court.

After a long day of volleyball, Xaverian of Brooklyn took the Lancers to five sets, but St. Mary's came out victorious. St. Mary's rallied from down 21-17 to win the opening set 25-23 behind some key points from junior tri-captain Gwen McCarthy and classmate Sarah Barnum. The Lancers rolled that momentum into a 25-10 win in the second set to take a 2-0 lead. But Xaverian then won 25-14 and 25-21 in sets three and four to send the match into a decisive fifth set.



Tied at 14-14, an overpass block by McCarthy sparked a closing 11-5 run that included four kills from junior tri-captain Carson Tyler. For the tournament, Tyler finished with 36 kills, 41 digs, and 11 aces, while McCarthy added 23 kills and 62 digs. Senior Gianna Blair (Eastern Tennessee State University) totaled 17 kills and nine blocks, and Sarah Barnum was key with 21 kills and 11 aces. Sophomore setter Madison Keem, the granddaughter of longtime coach Don Pieczynski, dished out 117 assists. Sophomore libero Lauren Payne finished with 59 total digs.

Men's Soccer Gets Quality Wins

The Men's Soccer Team put up one of its best seasons in years with wins against the likes of St. Joe's and Canisius. The team ranked as high as third in a mid-season *Buffalo News* poll.

The 10 seniors on this team really made the difference and made St. Mary's Soccer a force to be reckoned with, and we are so appreciative of their hard work and commitment to the program. Three of those seniors, Alex Bonuito, Braden Callahan, and Tyler

Warmington, will keep the team chemistry going as they all head to Nazareth College this Fall to continue their education and soccer careers. The other seniors on the team included Vinny Bargnesi, Kyle Norton, Owen Dernbach, Max Laistner, Liam Keyes, and Andrew Carlson.

Zito *(far left in photo)* took over the team after Matt Ard officially stepped down from the head coaching position this spring. Zito brings a wealth of experience to the job, serving as the Defensive Coordinator for the Lancers for the past four seasons. He has also spent



the past nine years with Lancaster Youth Football, coaching at all levels, including Pee-Wee, Freshmen, JV, and Varsity.

Coach Zito is looking forward to the opportunity in front of him. "I am very blessed to have the opportunity to be the Head Football Coach at St. Mary's High School," Zito said. "I will continue to build on what Coach Matt Ard started four years ago."

Zito's son, Owen, graduated in 2023, and his daughter, Scarlett, is going to be a sophomore this year.

As a player, Zito graduated from Lancaster High School in 1990 where he was a First Team All-NYS and All-WNY linebacker. He was also a *USA Today* High School All-American and Division I Defensive Player of the Year. Zito was also awarded the Shane Conlin Award, which is given to the best linebacker in WNY. He then went onto Buffalo State College where he was an All-American and was named to the All-Decade Team (1990's, First Team).

The junior varsity team went 30-11 during his two seasons as head coach. Propis also served as an assistant coach on the St. Mary's varsity team during those four years.



Propis knows there's no place like home. "Being a St. Mary's graduate, I wouldn't want to coach anywhere else," Propis said. "The culture here is something so unique and something I'm so excited to continue to be a part of and grow even further."

Propis was part of the St. Mary's Basketball Team that won the Class B Manhattan Cup in 2017 before heading off to Hilbert College where he graduated with a degree in Communications. He is currently pursuing his Masters in Education.

St. Mary's Athletic Director Zach Weiss knew Propis was the right fit for the job. "Frank has been an instrumental part of the Men's Basketball Program for really the past decade – first as a player and now as a coach," Weiss said. "Our players will continue to respond well to that type of first-hand experience and the energy Frank brings."

Col. Seelig was born in a small town in Pennsylvania to first-generation immigrant parents and raised as the oldest boy of nine children from a modest family. Through his upbringing, he learned the values of humility and determination, which would serve him well in his life's journey. Louis attended St. Mary's High School and graduated as a member of the Class of 1960. He was a star wrestler for the Lancers, going undefeated in his three years on the team.

He went on to serve in the Vietnam War. As a platoon leader in Vietnam, he was awarded a Purple Heart and Bronze Star for his courage, which further strengthened his resolve to overcome obstacles. He then pursued higher education and went on to become the Comptroller for President Reagan's Missile Defense Program, otherwise known as "Star Wars," a position of great responsibility that really challenged him.

During his time as a Senior Fellow at the National Defense University, he wrote a controversial book that predicted Desert Storm four years before it actually happened, which was a testament to his foresight and expertise.

Now, Col. Seelig is enjoying retirement with his wife of nearly 60 years, Jean. The couple lives outside a small town in Virginia, where they spend as much time as possible with their four grandchildren, traveling, and experiencing the world.

Col. Seelig is also a published author. Angelo Sciandra is the all-time winningest Head Football Coach in St. Mary's history with 51 wins from 1986-1999. He led the Lancers to league championships in '93 and '95. He also coached the Wrestling Team from 1991 to 1997 and the Baseball Team from 1992 to 1996. Coach Sciandra is known for mentoring other coaches and investing in his student athletes.

Kevin Burns '00 was a three-year varsity starter on the Football Team, playing QB, RB, and LB. He led the team in tackles for three years and led the MMHSAA in scoring and rushing as a senior. He was named to the US Navy Scholastic All-America First Team, was a Connolly Cup Finalist, and was chosen to play in the Kensington Lions Club All-Star High School Football Classic. Burns earned a full scholarship to play football at the University of Pennsylvania. He was also a member of the Track and Field Team and was a two-time Cleve-Hill Powerlifting Tournament Champion.

Don Pieczynski has been the Head Coach of the Women's Volleyball Team since 2007. He was an Assisntant Coach with the team prior to that, beginning in 1999. Pieczynski's all-time match record is 629-102 (.870). He stands undefeated in MMHSAA league play at 182-0 and has won 15 league championships and 9 NYS titles as a Head Coach. Pieczynski is also the father of two Lancer alums, Kelly (Pieczynski) Keem '99 and Traci (Pieczynski) Vinz '02.
